OF THE TENTH ANNIVERSARY OF JOSHUA TREE NATIONAL PARK  
RECOGNIZING IT AS A TREASURE AND NATURAL AND CULTURAL RESOURCE  
OF THE CITY AND COMMUNITY OF TWENTYNINE PALMS**

**WHEREAS**, the Oasis of Mara and vast area to the south of Twentynine Palms has been inhabited by Americans for more than 9,000 years; and in recent times was crossed by explorers and prospectors, and was the territory of historical gold and mineral mines and ranches; and

**WHEREAS**, the 800,000+ acre area, due to its magnificent scenic beauty, unique geology and zoology, was set aside as a National Monument in 1936 to take in the two great ecosystems of the Mojave and the Sonoran Deserts, 85 million year old rocks, displays of tremendous earth forces, exposed granite monoliths, rugged mountains of twisted rock, springtime flower displays, historic sites and palm oases; forests of ocotillo, cholla, joshua, yucca and creosote; and teems with the life of mountain sheep, coyotes, chuckwallas, sidewinders, and birds of all kinds; and

**WHEREAS**, built on pioneer spirit, our hardy desert community has been the home of Joshua Tree National Monument for 68 years and proudly houses the Headquarters and Visitor Center and the main entrance inside our city limits; and

**WHEREAS**, ten years ago, the monument was declared a National Park; and

**WHEREAS**, each year, hundreds of thousands of visitors from throughout the world come to the **National Park**, to enjoy it and the Twentynine Palms shops, galleries, studios, restaurants, lodging, entertainment and our City's colorful scenic vistas, sunrises and sunsets. Families and individuals hike, camp, go sightseeing, bike, bird watch, photograph, rock climb, sleep deeply under the lustrous stars, and just enjoy the relaxing and timeless spirit of the desert and the inspiring landscape of Twentynine Palms and the Park; and

**WHEREAS**, **Joshua Tree National Park** is an integral part of the character and identity of our fair city.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that the City Council hereby declares Saturday, November 13, 2004 as **Joshua Tree National Park** Day in Twentynine Palms and proclaims its admiration, recognition and appreciation of **Joshua Tree National Park** as a national and city resource and treasure, and as a major industry and much loved environment of the people of Twentynine Palms; and thanks the Superintendent, rangers, staff, volunteers, and patrons for their invaluable, outstanding and significant contributions to our fair City and our National Park; and asks all our citizens to celebrate the 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary of this inspiring natural and spiritual wonder at our City's doorstep.

#### Complaint Mediation

Received two complaints which one is currently being investigated at the time of this writing:

- Woman complained that an employee put her on hold for over five minutes, upon hanging up and calling back, the clerk made disparaging remarks to background personnel, after the woman told her

“do not put me on hold again!” Investigation findings indicate that the employee was trying to “expedite” the woman’s request, while handling multiple customers, while honoring the woman’s request not to put on hold again. Store Manager states that woman was advised of who, where and when to call if same or similar circumstances occurred again. Upon further discussion, woman admits she was aware “they were swamped; it was just a bad day for me.” She further states that she has not had any additional problems and will continue her patronage with this store.

- Woman complained that her carpets “smelt worse after cleaning than they did before she moved.” Complaint is currently under investigation waiting for the business to respond.

## MARKETING

Chamber attended the “Quality of Life Expo” aboard base on October 20<sup>th</sup>. The event was held to introduce the MCAGCC community to programs and services offered by MCCS and the Naval Hospital along with the available activities in our local Twentynine Palms community. Booth was well attended with a great amount of community events and merchant literature handed out.

## TOURS, CONFERENCES & MEETINGS

- The 29 Chamber of Commerce and the Morongo Basin Innkeepers partnered to send Pat Flanagan, marketing coordinator for the chamber, to the 2004 Rural Tourism Conference in Redding California. During the conference Ms. Flanagan gathered information and networked with fellow professionals from throughout the state.

At the 2004 Rural Tourism Conference some of the topics covered were, how competitive business can work together to achieve marketing goals; how web based, destination centered marketing can most efficiently and inexpensively promote tourism in rural destinations; how Business Improvement Districts (BIDs) are forming to fund tourism marketing; how nature tourism is one of the fastest growing segments in the tourism industry; and how to access and use market data to help rural destinations at little or no cost.

Chamber staff is currently working on arrangements for presentation to the City Council and other civic groups.

- Chamber staff attended a tour of the inns, motels, hotels with the management from each establishment. This enlightened tour shows the diversification in Twentynine Palms not only in cost, but ambiance and amenities each of these establishments offer. It is to be noted that the new Visitor Guide was easily available at each location visited.

- Chamber staff attended the Diane Feinstein reception hosted by the Wildlands Conservancy on the Mission Creek Preserve, October 22<sup>nd</sup>. Distributed the new Visitor Guide to a large variety of participants, including Pipes Canyon Preserve and Nipton.
- A continuing analysis of websites and publications concerning our area and their amenities are being critiqued and documented. New information has been provided to update the visit29.org website.

## **BUSINESS & ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT**

Chamber staff is vigorously researching the requirements for designating a route through Twentynine Palms in the National Scenic Byways program.

## **LEGISLATIVE AFFAIRS**

### **Candidates Forum**

A total of 80 community members attended The City Council Candidates Forum on Monday, October 18<sup>th</sup>, at 6:00 p.m.

### **Endorsements**

The Twentynine Palms Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors endorsed three important ballot measures: Measure C, Proposition 1A and Measure I.

Measure C is proposed bond measure which would secure funding for the renovation of classroom, laboratory, career, and technology infrastructure facilities at Copper Mountain College. Proposition 1A would ensure that local property tax and sales tax revenues remain with local government thereby safeguarding funding for public safety, health, libraries, parks, and other local services.

Measure I would continue the half-cent sales tax for transportation improvements countywide.

## **MILITARY AFFAIRS**

## STAFF REPORT

**To:** City Council  
**From:** City Manager/City Attorney  
**Date:** November 9, 2004

**Subject:** Public Hearing on Amendment to Informal Bidding Procedures Ordinance

**Recommendation:** Conduct the Public Hearing, introduce Ordinance No. 192, and direct staff to bring the Ordinance back for adoption. Adopt amendments to Twentynine Palms Municipal Code Section 3.01.160 in order to expand the number of public projects and maintenance work projects that may be bid out by informal bidding procedures.

**Discussion:** Twentynine Palms Municipal Code Section 3.01.160 permits “informal bidding” for public projects that cost less than \$75,000. However, the State Legislature has amended State law to allow informal bidding on public projects that cost up to \$100,000. Ordinance No. 192 amends Municipal Code Section 3.01.160 to incorporate a \$100,000 limit for informal bidding, thus making Municipal Code Section 3.01.160 consistent with State law.

State law also permits the City to utilize informal bidding procedures to bid out “maintenance work” of any cost. This allowance is not currently incorporated in the terms of the Municipal Code. Therefore, Ordinance No.192 also proposes to add “maintenance work” to the City’s informal bidding scheme.

**Background:** Typically, public works contracts that exceed a cost of \$5,000 must be formally, publicly bid. However, the California Uniform Construction Cost Accounting Act (the “Act”) allows cities to adopt “informal” bidding procedures for certain projects. Specifically, the Act allows informal bidding for any “public project” that is estimated to cost less than \$100,000. The Act also allows informal bidding for “maintenance work” of any cost or magnitude. Informal bidding procedures are administratively more efficient and less expensive than regular public bidding because the informal procedures allow the city to advertise projects to a smaller set of contractors.

The City of Twentynine Palms has adopted the Act’s informal bidding procedures as Municipal Code Section 3.01.160. Thus, the City may utilize informal bidding. However, when the City adopted Section 3.01.160, the Act permitted informal bidding for public projects that cost only up to \$75,000. The Act was subsequently amended to

allow informal bidding for public projects costing up to \$100,000. Moreover, Municipal Code Section 3.01.160, in its current form, does not incorporate the Act's broad informal bidding allowance for maintenance work. Therefore, in order to maximize the advantages of informal bidding, Municipal Code Section 3.01.160 should be amended to (a) expand informal bidding procedures to public projects costing up to \$100,00, and (b) permit all maintenance work to be bid out by informal bidding.

## ORDINANCE NO. 192

### ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TWENTYNINE PALMS, CALIFORNIA, AMENDING THE TWENTYNINE PALMS MUNICIPAL CODE, CHAPTER 3.01, FOR THE PURPOSE OF ALLOWING THE CITY TO FURTHER UTILIZE INFORMAL BIDDING PROCEDURES AND CITY WORK FORCES PURSUANT TO THE CALIFORNIA UNIFORM CONSTRUCTION COST ACCOUNTING ACT

**WHEREAS**, the City of Twentynine Palms ("City") has adopted the bidding procedures provided by the California Uniform Construction Cost Accounting Act (the "Act") in Chapter 3.01 of the Twentynine Palms Municipal Code; and

**WHEREAS**, the State Legislature recently raised the public project expense limits for the informal bidding procedures set forth in the Act; and

**WHEREAS**, the City's bidding procedures, as adopted in the Municipal Code, do not currently permit informal bidding procedures for maintenance work and non-public projects performed by the City; and

**WHEREAS**, it is advantageous to both the City and the public to revise Chapter 3.01 in order to enact (i) the new expense limits for informal bidding and (ii) an informal bidding process for maintenance work and non-public projects performed by the City.

**NOW, THEREFORE**, the City Council hereby ordains as follows:

**SECTION 1:** Section 3.01.060 of the Twentynine Palms Municipal Code is hereby amended to read in its entirety as follows:

3.01.160 Alternate Procedures. Pursuant to Section 22034 of the California Public Contract Code, when using the alternative procedures authorized in Section 3.01.150, the following provisions shall apply to public projects for which form bidding procedures are not required:

(a) *Definitions:* For purposes of this section, the terms "maintenance work" and "public projects" shall have the meanings provided those terms in Section 22002 of the California Public Contract Code.

(b) Public projects of Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) or less may be performed by employees of the City by force account, by negotiated contract, or by purchase order.

(c) Public projects of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) or less may be let to contract by informal bidding procedures set forth in subsection (e) of this section.

(d) Maintenance work and any other work which does not fall within the definition of "public project," as defined in Section 22002 of the California Public Contracts Code, may be let to contract by informal bidding procedures set forth in subsection (e) of this section.

(e) The following provisions shall be complied with in selecting contractors to perform either maintenance work or those public projects of \$100,000 or less..

(1) The Purchasing Officer shall maintain a list of qualified contractors, identified according to categories of work. The list shall be developed and maintained in accordance with criteria established for such lists by the California Uniform Construction Cost Accounting Commission.

(2) Each contractor on the list for the category of work being bid, and/or all construction trade journals specified by the Commission to receive mailed notice of all informal and formal construction contracts being bid for work in San Bernardino County, as determined by the Purchasing Officer, shall be mailed a notice inviting informal bids.

(3) All mailing of notices to contractors and construction trade journals pursuant to subsection (e) of this section shall be completed not less than ten (10) calendar days before bids would be due pursuant to such notice.

(4) Each notice inviting informal bids shall describe the project in general terms, state how to obtain more detailed information about the project, and specify the time and place for submission of bids.

(5) The City Manager is authorized to award informal bids in amounts up to Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) and to delegate that authority to the Purchasing Officer or the department heads at his or her discretion.

(6) As to public projects only, if all bids received are in excess of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00), but less than One Hundred Ten Thousand Dollars (\$110,000.00), the City Council may, by passage of a resolution by four-fifths (4/5) vote, award the contract, to the lowest responsible bidder, if the City Council determines the

estimate for the work was reasonable. If the City Council does not award the contract, the specifications must be reviewed and formal bids solicited.

**SECTION 2:** The City Clerk of the City of Twentynine Palms shall certify to the passage and adoption of this ordinance and shall cause the same to be posted and published in a manner required by law.
